


Luna Loves Library Day

This beautifully illustrated story is great for starting a discussion about families and what they might share together. The story includes themes of love, shared interests and parental separation.



5 Objectives

Lesson 1:

I can tell you who is in my family and why they are important.

Lesson 4:

I can show skills related to active listening e.g. eye contact.

Lesson 2:

I can tell you what I like to do with my family.

Lesson 5:

I can tell you what good manners are and how to show them.

Lesson 3:

I can tell you how I show love to my family.

Reflection and Evaluation

Sensitive Content in This Story

This story deals sensitively with themes of families, love and parental separation. It shows a family situation that may be different to other children's families. The illustrations also show a mum and dad who look different to each other, and the story illudes to them coming from different backgrounds. It also suggests that the mum and dad had frequent arguments.

These themes may prompt disclosures from children about their own family arrangements. Children may be inquisitive about different types of families, why families might live separately and why they might look different to each other. They may talk about big emotions they have seen from their own families.

Some children in the class may have experienced a parental separation and have found it difficult. It is important to create a safe space for these children to share their feelings, should they wish to and to support them in being part of the activities.

There is also discussion of hugs, which some children may not be comfortable with. Discuss different ideas of how people show love that include non-physical ways.

Some of the things children share in these discussions could be safeguarding concerns, therefore teachers and other staff should be prepared for this and follow their school's usual reporting system and procedures.

Wellbeing skill links

Through the following 5 lesson plans children will explore the following RSHE statutory (s) and PSHE non- statutory (n) wellbeing objectives.

Respectful relationships:

The conventions of courtesy and manners. (Lesson 4, 5)

Families and People who Care for Me:

That families are important for children growing up because they can give love security and stability. (Lesson 1, 2,

The characteristics of healthy family life, commitment to each other, including in times of difficulty, protection and care for children and other family members, the importance of spending time together and sharing each other's lives. (Lesson 1, 2)

That others' families, either in school or in the wider world, sometimes look different from their family, but that they should respect those differences and know that other children's families are also characterised by love and care. **(Lesson 3)**

That stable, caring relationships, which may be of different types, are at the heart of happy families, and are important for children's security as they grow up (Lesson 2, 3)

Further Skill Coverage:

All **Settle** activities cover: Simple self-care techniques, including the importance of rest, time spent with friends and family and the benefits of hobbies and interests.

All **Training** activities cover: That there is a normal range of emotions (e.g. happiness, sadness, anger, fear, surprise, nervousness) and scale of emotions that all humans experience in relation to different experiences and situations. How to recognise and talk about their emotions, including having a varied vocabulary of words to use when talking about their own and others' feelings.

Lesson Content

All five of the lesson plans related to this book follow our STORY structure





Settle: Start your session with a settling activity to encourage children to be in the right frame of mind for listening and learning about their wellbeing.





Training: Keep children's emotional literacy updated by spending a couple of minutes looking at a picture from the book and discussing the different emotions the characters are feeling.





Objective: Introduce a wellbeing objective for children to focus on when they are listening to the story





Read: Read the story and discuss the following guided reading questions as a class.





You: To finish the session children have the opportunity to reflect on the book and to relate the book to themselves.
